Prince Edward Island 2023 Provincial Election Questionnaire: Background

Retail Council of Canada:

Retail Council of Canada (RCC) is a not-for-profit, industry-funded association representing retailers of all sizes and formats, including department, grocery, pharmacy, specialty, discount, and independent stores as well as quick service restaurants and online merchants. We speak for an industry that touches the daily lives of Islanders in every corner of the province.

Prince Edward Island (PEI) Retail Facts:

- Retail is the largest private sector employer in Prince Edward Island, representing almost 9,900 employees, and \$300 million in total annual compensation paid to retail employees.
- PEI retail employee's average total hourly compensation is \$25.00 per hour.
- PEI retail employee's average hourly earnings is \$20.20 per hour.
- With hundreds of retail locations across the province, retail trade accounts for more than \$3.2 billion per year in PEI (more than \$2 billion in core retail). The quick service restaurant sector contributed over \$210 million to the PEI economy and was also one of the province's top employers.

Retail Realities:

- The retail sector provides a broad range of employment opportunities, from first-time skill development jobs to highly professional positions.
- Retail is a highly competitive sector, with traditionally low profit margins. Controlling costs is
 a high priority for retailers, as small cost increases can have a significant impact on a
 retailer's bottom line and business viability.

Retail's success in PEI is driven by increased investment, strong consumer demand, as well as sensible and focused policy and regulation by the provincial government.

PEI needs to do more to create predictability and fairness in its minimum wage decisions. RCC continues its call for PEI to follow the lead of every other Atlantic Province and mandate that minimum wage adjustments be based on an objective minimum wage formula that is tied to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the previous year. This approach provides businesses with predictability and allows them to plan for the cost increases throughout their salary scale that result from minimum wage increases.

The unpredictable nature of the government's approach creates pressure on RCC member businesses as the annual increases to the province's minimum wage outstrip inflation and revenue growth in many retail stores.

As part of its action plan Belonging and Thriving: A Poverty Reduction Action Plan for Prince Edward Island (2019-2024), the previous Liberal Government implemented many initiatives to improve the quality of life for all Islanders and specifically those living in low income. Some examples included income tax relief, major changes to social assistance, and increases to the minimum wage. We recognize that increases to minimum wage create pressure on small and medium sized businesses. This strategy is set to expire in 2024 and must be reviewed to ensure we are meeting the needs of our population - including those in our retail sector.

The Liberal Party is committed to:

- Reviewing the annual minimum wage process and developing a long-term strategy to create a transparent, fair, and predictable process that takes private wage trends into account
- 2. Although many RCC members have generous paid sick leave programs, the reality is that not all businesses are financially able to offer sick leave at the levels that have recently been proposed in PEI. Most provinces offer unpaid sick leave as these governments understand the ever-increasing cost pressures on businesses.
